# **Morning Sermon Notes**

# Desperate for Meaning (Jonah 4v1-11)

'Wherever we tap ultimate meaning in life, that's what we worship.' So says the non-Christian, US author David Foster Wallace. Scripture also tells us that to find ultimate meaning we must worship the right thing. *Where, in practice, do you look for ultimate meaning?* God asks both Jonah and us some telling questions:

#### 1) Why are you so angry? (4v1-4)

In v1, Jonah is red-hot angry with God, despite a seemingly successful mission to Nineveh in chapter 3. Jonah's idol problem, his distorted love of Israel and its religion, continues to catch up with him. He cannot swallow God being gracious and compassionate to Israel's pagan enemy, Assyria (v2). His whole identity and sense of meaning in life is crumbling before his very eyes (v3). God asks if his anger is good (v4). Jonah's view of God has been wrong, but he continues to cling to a god of his own making. But God knows that Jonah is desperate for real meaning, meaning that can only come from knowing God personally and truly for Who he is.

#### 2) Will you learn from Me? (4v5-10)

Jonah is still wanting God to change his mind (v5) and depart from Who he is. In these verses, God continues to woo Jonah with his love, and to counsel him using the shade plant and the worm which destroys it (v6-9). Jonah has a personal audience with the living God, he's looking the one who is Life in the face, and he says, I might as well be dead! God says to him again, in effect, "Why are you so angry?" (v9), 'Come to ME, trust my goodness and find rest.' Jonah is attached to 'stuff from God' (Israel, physical protection in Ch 2, the shade plant in 4v6-9). God wants him to receive his grace and be attached to him!

### 3) Will you treasure Me? (4v11)

The book of Jonah ends with a cliff-hanger: will Jonah receive God's grace and come to rest in God himself; will he see that the only ultimate Treasure worthy of the name is the Lord himself? The church in Laodicea also had an idol problem (Rev 3v19-22). Their love for God was 'like a morning mist, like a dew that easily evaporates'. Jesus loves them and is passionately grieved (Rev 3v16, 19). He offers to come into their lives and hearts so that they experience rich and lasting, personal fellowship with him (3v 20-21). Will they turn from their worthless idols, and let Christ in and be spiritually healed?
